

## Beth Sieloff, M.P.H., E-RYT

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Beth Sieloff, M.P.H., E-RYT, is the program manager for the cancer prevention and control programs at the Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan, including the Tribal Colon Cancer Screening grant and the Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Navigation Program. Beth is a first-generation American and a United States Air Force Chief Master Sergeant. Beth has been a health care professional and leader of national programs for the Department of Defense, the National Science Foundation, and the Department of Homeland Security across the globe for more than 35 years as well as tribal health programs at the Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan, Inc., since 2018. As a public health specialist, her efforts support a patient-centered and communitybased participatory approach to cancer disparities in rural tribal communities. The scope of her current role supports cancer prevention and control activities for rural tribal communities and the Native American populations in the state of Michigan as well as across the United States with the National Native Network. Her efforts have been successful in mitigating the influence of the social determinants of health and social needs for various health indicators, disease prevalence, and health care access as well as improving cancer screening rates by more than 25%, made possible in part by the availability of commercial tobacco cessation specialists and changes to the Michigan Medicaid policy that eliminated barriers to annual breast cancer screenings for minority and underserved women.
