Miller School of Medicine, where she earned her master of public health degree and doctorate of epidemiology degree with a specialty in public health ethics. Dr. Triplett has served as keynote speaker, facilitator, trainer, and panelist in numerous human rights and social justice advocacy efforts including the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation's inaugural racial equity summit and its 2023 Policy to the People Health Equity Summit entitled "Vital Signs." Dr. Triplett also cofacilitated the national summit on health equity for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Office of Health Equity and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. She spoke at Harvard University's McLean Hospital's Institute for Trauma-Informed Systems Change global leadership series with her presentation entitled "Social Justice, Faith, Trauma and the Way Forward", and she was keynote speaker for the Police, Treatment, and Community Collaborative conference. Dr. Triplett has also published a chapter entitled "Public Safety: An Essential Contributor to Public Health and Public Equity" in Health Equity, African Americans and Public Health, and she is a member of the advisory council for the Hastings Center and the leadership council for the Florida Bioethics Network.
